

### A Message From Our President

During the month of April several members attended the District Spring Conference and the NJSFWC Convention, both via Zoom. In the April Newsletter I noted most of the projects and successful fundraising efforts which our club accomplished during 2020 and you recall hearing about the annual reporting process to submit those projects to the NJSFWC headquarters. #### **Hazardous Waste Drop-Off**

Ladies, if you've got half-used cans of paint, aerosol cans you want out of your garage, now's the time to plan on saying, "Good riddance!"

MCMUA's Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Dates Set; May 22 is First Event

COVID-19 Guidelines Require Face Coverings, All Materials in the Trunk

The Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority will hold four Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Days in 2021 for residents, with the first opportunity on May 22.

Acceptable materials include pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, oil-based paints, stains, paint thinners and removers, solvents, automotive fluids, lead acid and rechargeable batteries, pool chemicals, and darkroom chemicals.

Also accepted are aerosol cans (not empty), propane cylinders, small quantities of asbestos (wetted, double bagged and sealed with duct tape to a 100 pound limit), driveway sealant, roofing tar, fluorescent bulbs, PCB-ballasts, mercury thermometers and switches, household cleaning products, muriatic acid.

**Latex paint** is NOT accepted because it is not considered hazardous. Latex paint should be dried out and disposed of in the trash.

Explosive or highly reactive materials, such as picric acid or nitro compounds, will not be accepted.

Drop off events are scheduled for:

- **Saturday, May 22,** 9 a.m. 2 p.m. at Morris County Public Safety Training Academy, 500 West Hanover Ave., Parsippany
- Saturday, June 26, 9 a.m. 2 p.m. at Morris County Public Safety Training Academy
- Saturday, September 25, 9 a.m. 2 p.m. at Morris County Public Safety Training Academy
- Saturday, October 23, 9 a.m. 2 p.m., at Chatham High School 255 Lafayette Ave., Chatham

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, MCMUA is requesting that patrons **store all materials in the trunk**, cargo area, or bed of the vehicle for easy access by the MUA's contractor, whose team will remove it from the vehicle. All participants dropping off household hazardous materials must **wear face coverings**, keep their vehicle windows closed, and **stay in their vehicles** for the duration of the event.

Shirley Holly, to deliver the awards to the different clubs of the Highlands District earned this year.


Our GFWC Woman's Club of Denville Rockaway earned quite a number of awards, which Janet Walker has included in her President's Message.

### Day 1 - April 26<sup>th</sup> - Monday (3) Workshops

Three wonderful Presentations were presented on the first day of NJFSWC Annual Convention, widening, members' knowledge on Sustainability, Rescuing Sea Mammals and Historical Achievements of our New Jersey Women's Clubs (NJSFWC)

Jan Hanson, President of the NJSFWC, introduced the speakers of the first two Workshops and Susan Fosdick introduced the speaker for the last Workshop. Jan Hanson gave credit for the Workshops to

Mary Wolfe, who organized these Workshops for last year's NJSFWC Annual Convention, with her Committee.

#### Rain Gardens Workshop #1

Consisted of two parts. The first part of Workshop was presented by Jennifer Coffey – Executive Director of

ANJEC, a non-profit organization, helps New Jersey environmental commissions, individuals, local and state agencies preserve natural resources and promote sustainable communities. Jennifer Coffey spoke of the initiatives ANJEC is evolved including

- 1 Supporting Open Space by purchasing land.
- 2 Advancing Environmental Justice for OBD (Over Burden Communities)
- 3 Protection, Preservation and Policy Community Engagement-local Action.
- 4 Installing Green Infrastructure in Communities (such as Rain Gardens discussed shortly)
- 5 Movement NJ No Plastics. One of our biggest concerns in our nation is the use of single use plastics. Recycling does not help; a lot of the labeled plastics are not recyclable and end in landfills. ANJEC continues pushing legislation to stem the use of single use plastics in New Jersey, the most densely populated state. The production of plastics is environmentally destructive, as well, as the use of the single use plastics.
- 6. Keeping our waterways unpolluted This last initiative led into the second part of the Workshop

#### Rain Gardens Workshop #1 Part 2. Day 1 April 26<sup>th</sup> Monday



Speaker Dr. Chris Obropta's presentation explained his work with Rutgers University, their promotion of Rain Gardens, a prevention of misguided rainwater runoff, leading into our water system. I was impressed on the esthetics of this Green Infrastructure promoted in our different New Jersey communities by Chris Obropta and Rutgers Univ. (Rutgers Cooperative Water Resource Program). On the website, www.water.rutgers.edu, one, among many offers, is a free download of Rainwater Garden Manual, showing installation and maintenance. These rainwater gardens, among a show of

beautiful flowers and plants, can be a garden that attracts honeybees and monarch butterflies, 2 endangered species. Also recycled material can be used to create seating areas and walking paths within these Rainwater Gardens. Both Jennifer Coffey and Dr. Chris Obropta offered further assistance and answering of questions by contacting their websites and emails.

#### The History of the Palisades Workshop #2 Day 1 April 26<sup>th</sup> Monday

Pres. Jan Hanson introduced speaker Eric Nelsen (Palisade Park Commission) who gave an amazing presentation on the Preservation of the Palisades due to the persistence of the GFWC New Jersey Sate Federation of Women's Clubs.

The New Jersey Woman's Clubs, back in the early 1900's rallied to preserve the Palisades against the stripping by the Quarrying Corporation, arguing there must be preservations of this 12 mile stretch along the Hudson River, shared by both New York and New Jersey, for the sake of scenery and history. The Palisades border on the Hudson River, a very strategic river for the Continental Army to defend against the British, during the Revolutionary War. Also, the Palisades would serve, preserved in it natural

scenic state, as the lungs for the inner cities of New York and New Jersey. Theodore Roosevelt was governor of New York, at the time, a great supporter of Preservation. The Women's Clubs of New Jersey saw it an

opportune time to push the then NJ Governor Foster Voorhees and NJ Legislature to past legislation (mind you before Women had the right to vote) to join the Interstate Park Commission. Governor Roosevelt, at the same time, through legislation, got NY to create this Commission. This commission went ahead to buy all the land along the 12-mile stretch of the Palisades. The dedication of this Interstate Park, of the Palisades took place on 1909 on the 300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Henry Hudson's sailing up the

Hudson River. 20 years later the Monument, dedicated to the NJ Woman's Club, was erected in the Palisades Parks, acknowledging their campaign to preserve the natural beauties of the Park for generations to come.

#### NJSFWC Cont.- Marine Mammal Stranding Center- Workshop #3- April 26<sup>th</sup> Monday

Susan Fosdick introduced the speaker and founder, Sheila Dean of this nonprofit organization

**Sean Mammals Stranding Center.** SSMC's mission is to save Marine Mammals and Sea Turtles all along the New Jersey Coast. Marine Mammal Stranding Center was started in 1978 by Robert Schoelkopt and Sheila Dean, their mission to save this wildlife. Sheila Dean introduced us to the array of sea mammals and sea turtles found along the New Jersey coast.

Marine Mammals Stranding Center's (MMSC) aim is to rescue and release these sea mammals and sea turtles back into Atlantic ocean with the help of their 10 employees and over 300 volunteers. Their facilities, on Brigantine Island, north of Atlantic city, has the necessary spaces to rehabilitate the animals, if on rescue these animals are not able to be returned to the sea right away.

There are several reasons these sea mammals need rescue including injury, fatigue, and sickness. Sadly a lot of these mammals are victims of the plastics we discard including bunches of helium balloons set off into the air as well as uncut plastic rings of six packs and plastic bags. Sea turtle, feeding on jellyfish, by mistake ingest plastic bags, which inflate in their systems not allowing them to descend under water, causing them to become victims of boat propeller collisions. Also sea mammals are migrating further north as seawaters are warming until there is a sudden freeze sending these animals into hypothermia.

Sheila explained further MMSC receives the calls to rescue marine animals from the public as well as from the police. A volunteer goes to the sight to access the situation and cooperate with the coast guard before actually a group, from MMSC, goes out either with any of their trucks or boats for the rescue. Shirley Holley led the workshop outlining the many qualities of good leadership including; 1. Commitment

- 2. Respect for other members of your club
- 3. Vision of where to take the club 4. Bringing the club together for common goal.

Susan Chamber VP GFWC brought out that positive qualities, in a club, are

Trust, Respect, Mutual Understanding, Team Work, Maintaining Membership.

Without membership there is no need for leadership.

Without a leader there is no focus for the club.

Suggestions for increasing membership included recruiting spouses and significant others of members. The session was then opened to the Presidents, other officials and members to ask questions or to share their ideas. Our President Janet shared how she felt Zoom has benefited our club, proceeding to use it for Board Meetings and Evening Meetings. Our District VP Nancy Levy suggested, in the transfer of power of Leadership in a club, to have a prepared manual, which she created in the transfer of her leadership, in our club, to another member. #### 8 Things You May Not Know About Memorial Day

As the Civil War neared its end, thousands of Union soldiers, held as prisoners of war, were herded into a series of hastily assembled camps in Charleston, South Carolina. Conditions at one camp, a former racetrack near the city's Citadel, were so bad that more than 250

prisoners died from disease or exposure, and were buried in a mass grave behind the track's grandstand

- •Three weeks after the Confederate surrender, an unusual procession entered the former camp: On May 1, 1865, more than **1,000 recently freed slaves**, (Making the earliest commemoration organized by recently freed slaves) accompanied by regiments of the U.S. Colored Troops (including the Massachusetts 54th Infantry) and a handful of white Charlestonians, gathered in the camp to consecrate a new, proper burial site for the Union dead. The group sang hymns, gave readings and distributed flowers around the cemetery, which they dedicated to the "Martyrs of the Race Course."
- •In May 1868, **General John A. Logan**, the commander-in-chief of the Union veterans' group known as the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a decree that May 30 should become a nationwide day of commemoration for the more than 620,000 soldiers killed in the recently ended Civil War. On Decoration Day, as Logan dubbed it, Americans should lay flowers and decorate the graves of the war dead "whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land."
- •American's embraced the notion of "Decoration Day" immediately. That first year, more than 27 states held some sort of ceremony, with more than 5,000 people in attendance at a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery. By 1890, every former state of the Union had adopted it as an official holiday. But for more than 50 years, the holiday was used to commemorate those killed just in the Civil War, not in any other American conflict. It wasn't until America's entry into World War I that the tradition was expanded to include those killed in all wars, and Memorial Day was not officially recognized nationwide until the 1970s, with America deeply embroiled in the Vietnam War.

Although the term Memorial Day was used beginning in the 1880s, the holiday was officially known as Decoration Day for more than a century, when it was changed, by federal law. Four years later, the Uniform Monday Holiday Act of 1968 finally went into effect, moving Memorial Day from its traditional observance on May 30 (regardless of the day of the week), to a set day—the last Monday in May. The move has not been without controversy, though. Veterans groups, concerned that more Americans associate the holiday with first long weekend of the summer and not its intended purpose to honor the nation's war dead, continue to lobby for a return to the May 30 observances.

Among the Everglades' abundant wildlife are the endangered leatherback turtle, Florida panther and West Indian manatee.

https://www.nps.gov/ever/learn/historyculture/people.htm Native Americans and later on Anglo-American settlers known as "Gladesmen" traversed the wild landscape and came to rely on its abundant natural resources, and explore its mysteries. Developers would make their mark on the land in a different way, by seeking to alter the wetland landscape by draining the land and building roads and canals. In response to the rapid alterations, which were affecting the Everglades, Conservation groups like the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs pioneered efforts to reclaim and save the "River of Grass" from further development.

history-royal-palm-state-park/ The lands, which would become Royal Palm State Park, were first studied by scientists in the late 19th century and revered for their "botanical diversity and spectacular hammock amongst the glades". Unfortunately, scientists were not the only ones taking an interest in the area. Railroad magnate, Henry Flagler, purchased the land with an eye to building a railroad throughout eastern Florida. The scientific community reacted by calling for the land to be set aside as a state park.

(From South Dade Women's Club Newsletter "A group of women, who did not yet have the right to vote created Florida's first state park at Paradise Key - Royal Palm Hammock on 1916".)

The Florida Federation of Women's Clubs, particularly Florida Federation State President May Mann Jennings (1914-1916), took up the cause to preserve this land. May Mann Jennings persuaded the Florida Legislature to deed 960 acres to create the park, matching the 960 acres already donated by Mrs. Henry Flagler, the widow of Florida East Coast Railway magnate Henry Flagler. Through this legislation, the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs became the only Federation in the U.S. to own a state park. Florida Federation hired a park ranger, built a lodge, cut roads, and maintained the park for more than 30 years. In 1947, Royal Palm Park was deeded to the National Park Service and became the nucleus of Everglades National Park.

(The campaign to continue to preserve the entire Everglades can be attributed to Marjorie Stoneman Douglas, who was born 1890 and passed away 1998. As a young woman, Douglas was outspoken and politically conscious of the women's suffrage and civil rights movements. She was called upon to take a central role in the protection of the Everglades when she was 79 years old. (1969) For the remaining 29 years of her life. She was "a relentless reporter and fearless crusader" for the natural preservation and restoration of the Everglades National Park.)



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
